

Josephus & Eusebius, Part I

- James the Greater was thrown down from this, but did not die.
- Eusebius admits that some doubt the authenticity of this general epistle, because few early writers refer to it.
- Eusebius notes that Mark is mentioned in this general epistle, which he claims was composed in Rome.
- Nero beheaded him in Rome.
- A group of Egyptian ascetics described by Philo.
- The Egyptian assembled 30,000 "dupes" here, then led them to their death.
- First of the emperors "to be the declared enemy of the worship of Almighty God."
- Eusebius considered him the "prime author" of every heresy.
- The Herod responsible for the death of James son of Zebedee.
- Disputed reference to Jesus found in book XVIII of Jewish Antiquities.
- Known only by his country of origin, Eusebius calls him a "fraud who posed as a seer."
- Peter and Paul each had one in Rome named after them, according to Eusebius.
- James the Greater was the first Bishop of this city.
- Because of him, the whole city of Edessa came to believe in Christ.
- Josephus' autobiography.
- Chosen as successor to Judas Iscariot.
- Eusebius mentions a famine that "descended on the whole world" during his reign.
- Josephus' detailed history of the First Revolt.
- First city where the followers of Jesus were called "Christian."
- The first Christian martyr.
- Josephus was commander of the Jewish forces in this region during the First Revolt.
- First to take the gospel to Samaria, and introduced it to Ethiopia as well.
- Pilate stole money from the Jerusalem temple to build one.

- Eusebius confirms the tradition that this book was written by "Luke."
- Jewish philosopher who faced off against Apion.
- Josephus' history of Judaism from the Patriarchal period up to the First Revolt.
- Eusebius claims that this gospel is based on the eyewitness testimony of Peter.
- Nero crucified him in Rome.
- Another surname for James the Righteous.
- James was nicknamed this because of his "outstanding virtue."
- Roman emperor who almost placed a statue of Jupiter the Glorious in the Jerusalem temple.
- Josephus' response to a pagan critic of Judaism.
- He informed the emperor Tiberius of the story of Jesus' death and resurrection.
- Eusebius claims that this letter was composed while Paul was in prison in Rome.
- Eusebius quotes his account of James' martyrdom.
- Eusebius claims that Mark was first to establish churches here.
- Eusebius quotes Josephus' description of these "daggermen," who killed Jonathan the high priest.
- Bishop of Caesaria and historian of early Christianity.
- Josephus prophesied that he would become emperor.
- He led thousands to their death at the Jordan, claiming he could part it.
- Vespasian's son; took control of Roman forces during the First Revolt when his father returned to Rome.
- Josephus joined this sect of Judaism at age 19.
- Hegeppus describes James as one of these.
- Roman-appointed historian of Judaism.
- Roman procurator who crucified numerous Jews in Jerusalem before the First Revolt.
